
This 2004 Indian film was one of the first Bollywood movies to ever make an appearance on a US movie screen. Needless to say, it received a lot of attention from fans and non-fans alike. For starters, it's worth noting that, although this film was released in 2004, the script for it was actually written in 1995. Who wrote this movie? Director Yash Chopra, who has acted as a producer for over 80 Bollywood films to date, decided to write this film because of his wife's battle with cancer. This role became even more important to him after she died in the year 2000. This event prompted Chopra to start a foundation called "The Anjali Foundation," which promotes awareness of cancer and spreads a message of hope and healing through a combination of Yoga and Ayurveda. The storyline itself was inspired by the film *The Bridges of Madison County*. If you've seen that movie, you'll likely understand why Chopra was interested in using it as a source of inspiration. It tells the story of a woman who has had her love life shaken up by her husband's decision to join the army. She meets someone whom she feels is more happily married than she is, which causes her to question some of her choices. Vijay Raaz wrote the script for this movie after reading some books about Indian history that mentioned Veer-Zara, or "brave men." He used this as the basis for his story, which centers on two lovers who are separated due to circumstance rather than choice. What was the cast of this film? When it came time to cast the film, Chopra wanted actors who could truly embody the characters. He believed that although many Bollywood films were missing this element at that point in time, he could find actors who were able to do so. Shah Rukh Khan was picked for the part of Veer Pratap Singh, while Aishwarya Rai (who also played his real-life wife) was cast as Shekhar's wife, Pamela Chopra. They both agreed to play their characters in an unglamorous manner, which helped set the tone for the rest of the film. They were both joined by actors such as Sanjay Dutt (who plays Rajiv Chopra), Javed Khan (Taragar) and Rishi Kapoor (Joginder). The film began to take shape at this point. How the script was turned into a movie: The final script was written, and Chopra started production of the movie. He pulled together a team of people who would help him make Veer-Zara happen. The first person he brought onboard was Nagesh Kukunoor, who worked as an assistant director during that time.

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
